Dixie: *My adoption celebration and dedication at GBF.*

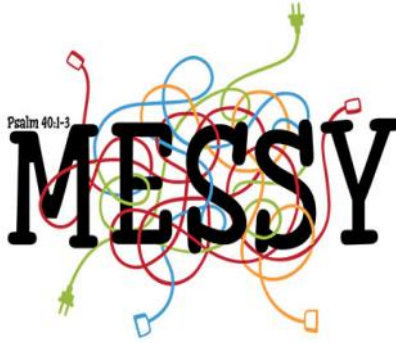
Dakota: *Playing with friends.*

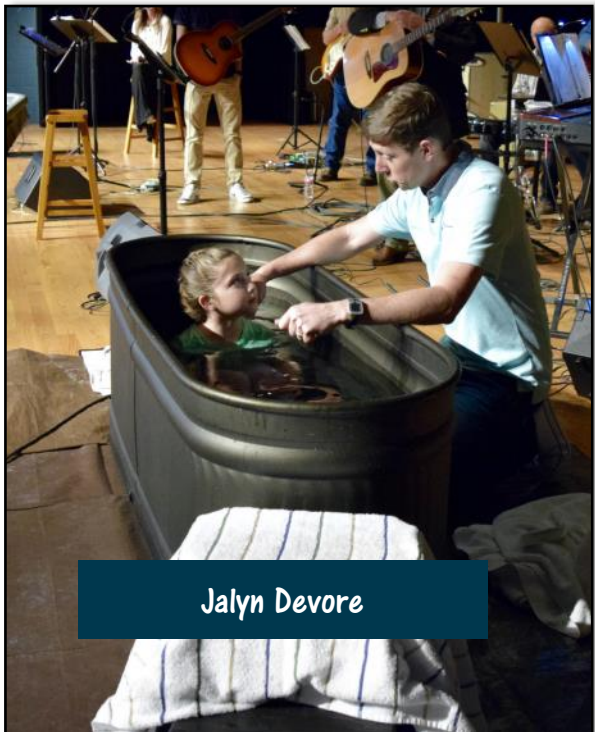

10 Ways Churches Get Off Mission

It's been said that if everything is the mission, then nothing is. There are things that the church *can* do, but those things should not be confused with the what the church *must* do. The church's mission is to make disciples of Jesus Christ. Most would agree on that. But while we agree that's what we must do, we still have to be careful that we stay ON MISSION, that we not get distracted away from our central calling of disciple-making. Jared Wilson, Director of Content Strategy for Midwestern Seminary, offers 10 common hazards we can fall into that can get a church off of our mission:

1. They over-program. In this way, we mistake activity for mission and busy-ness for fruitfulness. And while Christians fellowshiping and "doing life" with each other is important, some churches fill the calendar with so many programs and meetings, etc. that their people have little to no margin to be on mission.

2. They pour all their energy into the weekend service. For many churches, the extent of their weekly thinking, planning, strategy, creativity, etc. is channeled into the production of the weekend gathering. They justify this inward focus by trying to design this service as evangelistically and seeker-minded as possible, but it effectively turns the "go and tell" of mission into the "come and see" of attraction.

3. They use too much insider lingo. The church service in particular is biblically *for the Christian*, but the New Testament still tells us it ought to be intelligible to "outsiders." Some churches communicate only "inside baseball" in their services and groups so that it becomes difficult for interested unbelievers to follow and seek to understand.

4. They are just plain unwelcoming. We all know about churches that don't acknowledge visitors. There are also community groups that don't have an open door for curious unbelievers and other visitors. There are people who look down their noses if someone is in their parking space or pew. Some church communities just aren't interested in growing or reaching out.

5. They are preoccupied with politics. Their pastors are too busy culture-warring to be soul-winning and their people are too busy arguing about who should be President to consider how their anger and worry might (or might not) adorn the gospel.

6. They are still stuck in the past, culturally speaking. Some churches look frozen in time. While there are lots of rich things from our history and tradition worth holding onto, having a church that looks like it stepped out of a time machine in the 1970s probably isn't it. Some churches are so committed to preserving how they've always been, they cannot adequately contextualize the gospel for their communities today.

7. They're trying to re-create the past. Some churches have moved on from the past, but are desperate to get it back. But a church can kill its future by constantly trying to recapture "the good ol' days," mainly because this is an inward focus and also because outsiders, visitors, and the lost don't care one bit about your church's "good ol' days."

8. They are preoccupied with social justice causes but not doctrine. Meeting people's felt needs and addressing systemic, cultural ills can be biblical and valid implications of the gospel, but a lot of churches forget the gospel part. They trade in the primary purpose of the gospel for its implications. This is a particularly deceptive mode to be in, because socially-conscious churches look like they're on mission. But if the gospel is not at the center of what we say and do, it's not God's mission that we're on.

9. They are doctrinally rigorous but socially withdrawn. The opposite of the above problem. These churches are hearers of the word only. Sometimes they are so suspicious of "social justice" and the "social gospel" that they'd rather die than be caught making a concerted effort to care for the poor, the widow, and the orphan.

10. They are divided or otherwise riddled with conflict and power plays. Some churches are fertile ground for power-hungry folks or divisive personalities jockeying for position. In many of these churches, the leaders may be interested in kingdom mission but find that so much of their energy is occupied in mediating arguments, managing contentious member meetings, defending themselves, or just trying to keep the peace. In these cases, people have forgotten what a church is even for.

STUDENT MINISTRY UPDATE

In March, the student ministry finished our series *Love, Sex, and Lasting Relationships*. Most of our time was spent looking at the 12 Tests of Love. In Romans 12:9 Paul says, “Let your love be genuine.” Some translations read “without hypocrisy.” Most of us have learned how to pretend love others – how to speak kindly, avoid hurting feelings, and appear to feel moved with compassion when we hear of others needs or troubles.

A lot of us even learned how to show love in order to get something from someone. We use love as a tool to use people. But God calls us to real and genuine love that goes beyond simply being polite because it benefits you. Genuine love requires a deliberate effort on our parts. It demands our time and our effort. Genuine love is giving the other person what he or she needs the most when they least deserve it at great personal cost to you. Below are the 12 tests we looked at:

1. **The Test of Time:** Love benefits and grows with time; Infatuation ebbs and diminishes with time. Infatuation can come suddenly. I've never really been a fan of that term “falling in love”. We don't fall into love. We fall into infatuation. We grow into love. Infatuation can explode out of nowhere, but real love takes time.
2. **The Test of Knowledge:** Love grows out of an appraisal of all the know characteristics of the other person. Infatuation may grow out of only an acquaintance with these characteristics of the other person. With infatuation, you may not even know the person, but a glance in your direction, a smile, or even a catching of the eyes can act as a trigger that sets off the chemicals in your brain. There is no basic knowledge about the other person. Love wants to study the other person's needs, desires, dreams, and hopes because it wants to do everything to make them a reality. How well do you know the other person?
3. **The Test of Focus:** Genuine love is other-person centered. Infatuation is self-centered. Infatuation is always more concerned with what they are receiving. Love is always more concerned with meeting the other person's needs.
4. **The Test of Singularity:** Genuine love is focused on only one person. An infatuated person may be “in love” with two or more persons simultaneously. You can and will be infatuated with a lot of different people, but that is not love.
5. **The Test of Security:** Genuine love requires a sense of security and feelings of trust. An infatuated person seems to have a blind sense of security, based on wishful thinking instead of careful consideration. Infatuation is blind to problems. Infatuation has insecurities that often times show itself as jealousy. Jealousy is often a sign of a lack of trust, and a lack of trust is a sign of infatuation.
6. **The Test of Work:** An individual in love works for the other person, for his or her mutual benefit. An infatuated person loses his or her ambition, appetite, and interest in everyday affairs. A woman in love may study to make her husband proud. A man in love may have his ambitions spurred on by planning and saving for their future together. People genuinely in love daydream about the potential of their relationship, and strive forward to make it happen.
7. **The Test of Problem Solving:** A couple in love faces problems frankly and tries to solve them. Infatuated people tend to disregard or try to ignore problems. If there are barriers in front of a couple planning to get married, they will address them and remove them. They do not go into marriage blindly.
8. **The Test of Distance:** Love knows the importance of distance. Infatuation imagines loves to be intense closeness, 24/7, all the time. In you spend some time separated from the person you claim to love, the time apart will teach you a lot about the quality of your relationship. Since genuine love is not based on just emotions, some distance will often let you know what is really in your heart. If there is not a sense of separateness, a distinct life, relationships with other people, and healthy balance, then the relationship is probably more infatuation than genuine love.
9. **The Test of Physical Attraction:** Physical attraction is a relatively small part of genuine love, but it is not the central focus of infatuation. “Small part” does not mean “no part.” If you are not physically attracted to that person you are thinking about spending the rest of your life with, I would call that a problem. The reality is that sexual attraction has a part in genuine love. God's word does not talk down about being physically attracted to someone. What goes wrong here is when we decide that sexual fulfillment is the quickest and best way to find love.
10. **The Test of Affection:** In love affection is expressed later in the relationship, involving the external expression of the physical attraction we just described. In infatuation affection is expressed early on. Sometimes even at the beginning of the relationship. Affection pushes both people towards greater and greater physical intimacy.
11. **The Test of Stability:** Love tends to endure. Infatuation may change suddenly and unpredictably. With infatuation, the wind determines where you're in love. Real love is stable. There is commitment. This is something that needs to be measured over time by observing the other person in the context of his or her other relationships. How is he or she with her parents, friends, or enemies?
12. **The Test of Delayed Gratification:** A couple in genuine love is not indifferent to the timing of their wedding, but they do not feel an irresistible urge to drive toward it. Genuine love is about understanding that there is something really worth waiting for.
