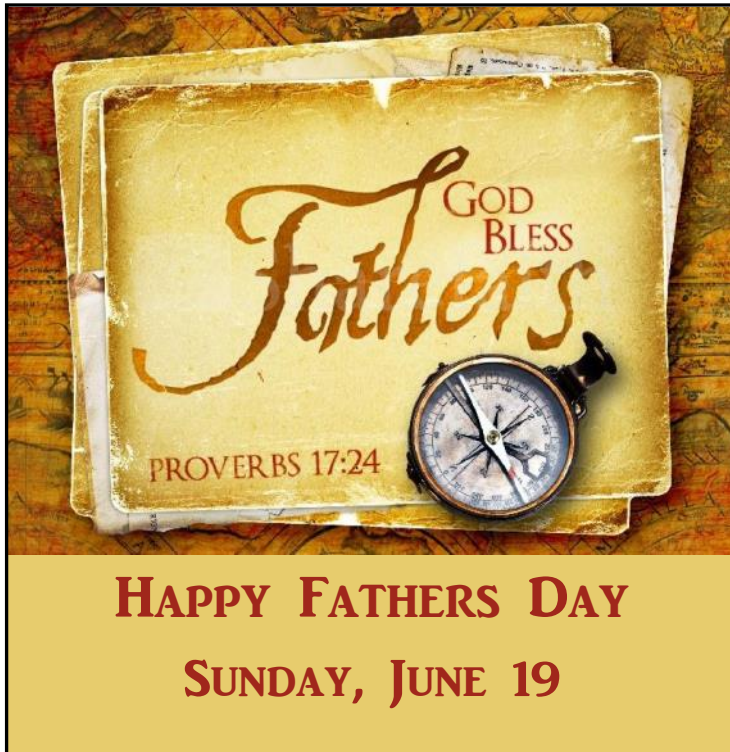

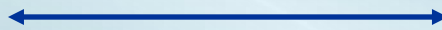

During the month of June, the study will include topics from the ESV Men's Devotional Bible.

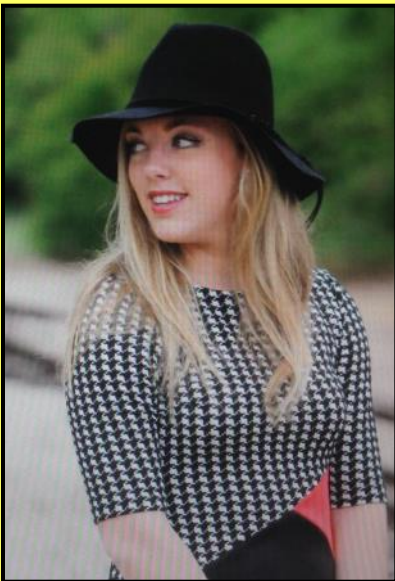
The men will take July off and resume meeting in August with a new study.

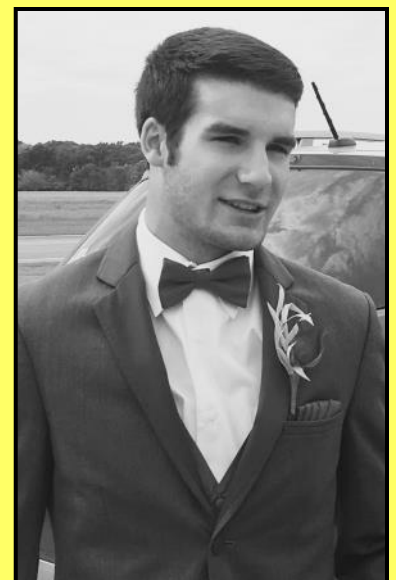

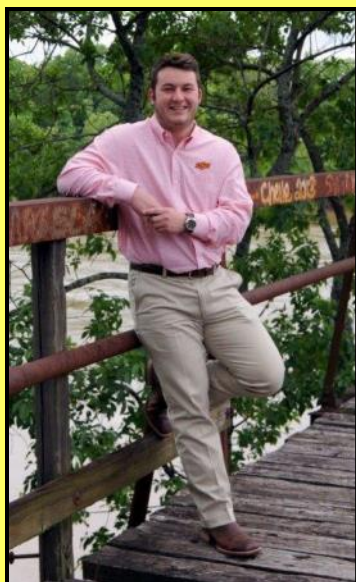

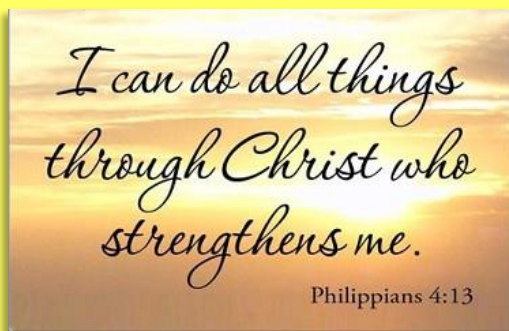

8 Reasons to Preach Through Books of the Bible

We've primarily taught thru books of the Bible on Sunday mornings at Grace Bible for several years now. It doesn't sound cool, slick, or "relevant" but there are benefits to this approach, Jared C. Wilson outlines a few in this post: [8 Reasons To Preach Through Books of the Bible](#).

The resurgence in commitment in many evangelical circles to expository preaching is a very encouraging sign as the contemporary church navigates so many shifting cultural trends with so many shifting stylistic trends of its own. As many younger churchmen have begun to look not at the latest preaching styles but at what evangelicalism's elder statesmen have been doing for years — not to mention, as they've begun studying the homiletical practices of the gospel renewal movements throughout church history — we've fortunately seen a rise in expositional preaching. Many of us have maintained a commitment to this kind of explication even when our sermons happen to be topical!

While there's no need to be dogmatic about this kind of sermon delivery, and while I think taking time for short topical sermon series or strategic "stand-alone" messages can be good and helpful, I do think it is generally wise for a pastor not just to preach expositively, but to preach expositively through entire books of the Bible. I think every preacher ought to endeavor to feed his flock this way. And here are eight reasons why:

1. It's biblical.

Contrary to what some have said, expository preaching through books of the Bible has biblical precedent. The two most notable examples can be found in Nehemiah 8, where Ezra preaches through the book of the Law, "giving the sense" (v.8) as he goes, and of course in Luke 24, where "beginning with Moses and all the Prophets, Jesus interpreted to them in all the Scriptures the things concerning himself" (v.27).

2. It helps people learn their Bible.

It is a sad reality that most Christians get most of their Bible at church. We want them to spend daily time in the word, of course, but too many don't and won't. Preaching through books of the Bible, then, over time exposes churchgoers to the fullness of God's counsel.

3. It spiritually stretches the preacher and deepens his understanding of God.

If a preacher will commit to preaching through entire books of the Bible, he will find himself dealing with difficult and complex passages he might otherwise have avoided. Systematically working through a book means you can't skip the confusing parts or the scandalous parts or the "boring" parts, the study of all of which is helpful to the preacher's own devotional

life — since *all* Scripture is breathed out by God and useful ([2 Tim. 3:16](#)) - and consequently helpful to the congregation.

4. It puts controversial or "hot topic" issues in their proper place.

A preacher committed to preaching through books of the Bible can't hobby-horse or camp out on one political, social, or cultural issue he feels most important. His preaching isn't being driven by Hallmark or the headlines. Thus, he gets around to the "social issues" when the Bible does and ends up correlating his concern and energy about them to the Bible's concern and energy about them.

5. It helps Christians see the full storyline of redemption.

The gospel announcement of Christ's sinless life, sacrificial death, and glorious resurrection for the salvation of sinners is a grand plan foreshadowed and echoed throughout all of Scripture, and preaching through entire books of the Bible helps churches see the epic story God is telling about his Son from the foundation of the world.

6. It more greatly magnifies the glory of Jesus Christ.

As Jesus himself says to those disciples on the road to Emmaus, even the old covenant Scriptures are "about himself." And as Paul says, all the promises of God find their "yes and amen" in Jesus ([2 Cor. 1:20](#)). To not preach through as many biblical texts as you can is to withhold certain aspects of Christ's glory from your church.

7. It fosters congregational patience, endurance, and commitment to the word.

Hopping from one topic to the next, jumping around according to pastoral interest or current devotional mood, has some advantages to be sure, but a commitment to a book more befits the plodding needed for faithful, long-term ministry. Preachers who preach through books of the Bible logically think in more long-term ways, which is beneficial for pastoral fruitfulness. And the way preachers preach shapes their church.

8. It creates a longer pastoral and congregational legacy.

To preach with the times is to go where all times go. Now, sermons ought to be applicable and relevant to the Christian's daily life and the world we live in. But the great thing about the Scriptures is that they are remarkably applicable and relevant to the world we live in *without our help*! And while sermons fashioned toward the tyranny of the now may be of some help for some time, sermons preached from the eternal word can be of help for all time. In the long run of pastoral ministry and the life of the church, a pastor who resources his congregation with faithful, plodding biblical exposition is providing a body of work that will live much longer after his own departure.

STUDENT MINISTRY UPDATE

We finished our series based out of the book Daniel called “Set Apart”. Romans 12:2 says, “Do not be conformed to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewal of your mind.” Christians will never bring the world to God by becoming just like them. We are to be something different than what we see in the world around us. The life of a Christian is counter-cultural. In the book of Daniel, we see many examples of how a young person living in culture that does not honor God can still live a life that is God glorifying.

Breakaway Weekend, April 30 - May 1: Breakaway Weekend was held at Straight Arrow Camps off of Lake Texoma. Our verse for Breakaway was Hebrews 12:1-2: “...let us also lay aside every weight, and sin which clings so closely, and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us, ²looking to Jesus, the founder and perfecter of our faith, who for the joy that was set before him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is seated at the right hand of the throne of God.”

In short, it is a time for students to break away from the influences that discourage them as young Christians, and a time to be encouraged by the love of God, their leaders, and one another.

During our time, I witnessed our students have an incredible amount of fun. Whether they were throwing water balloons or throwing Vienna Sausages, our students were having fun and not apologizing for it. I witnessed students grow closer in their relationships with other students. No student was made to feel like the outcast of the group. The students’ relationships with their youth leaders were deepened. Every student was able to walk away from that weekend knowing that someone else cares for the well-being of their soul. Not because they have some alternative motive, but because they genuinely care about them. Every student was also preached the gospel of Jesus Christ. Our pastor, Roy Layman, shared his testimony of what Christ had done and is continuing to do in his life. Our students left knowing the truth that there is no life greater than a life lived for Christ. Every other life this world has to offer will always fall short and leave you filing empty. In GBF Student Ministry, we aim to always be gospel-centered, relational, and fun in everything that we do. This past weekend was no exception

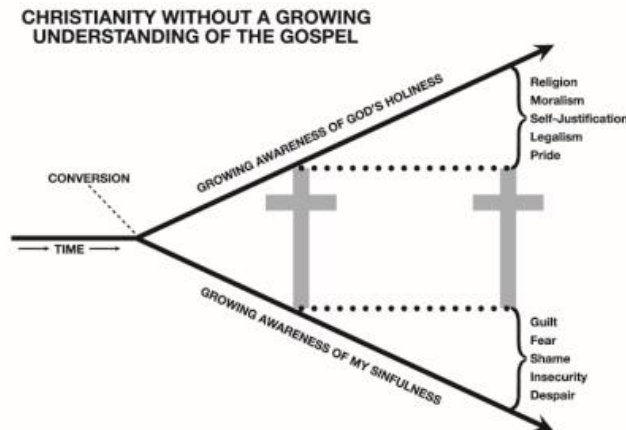


AN ABSOLUTE MUST: A Growing Understanding of the Gospel

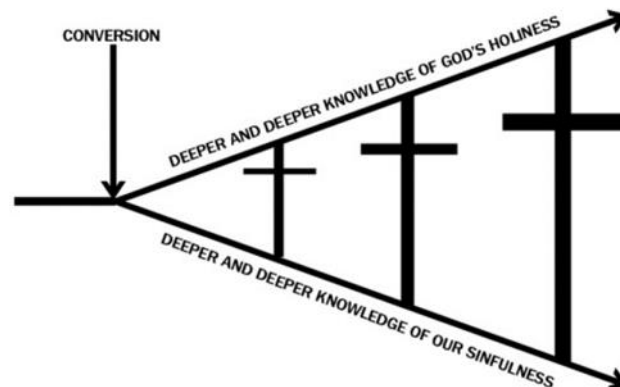

Most of our New Testament is made up of letters written to churches reminding them of the gospel (the good news that Christ died for sinners). Ever wonder why? Why would "saved" people need to hear the gospel of Jesus again? The truth is we never outgrow the gospel. "The gospel is not just the A-B-C's but the A-Z of Christianity" -Tim Keller.

The fact is, a growing awareness of God's holiness, and a growing awareness of our own sinfulness, without a growing appreciation for the gospel, is hurtful. The picture below illustrates this well. Notice what happens when we don't increase our view of the gospel (the cross). We try to fill the growing gap with **performance** (religion, moralism, self-justification, legalism, pride) and/or **pain** (guilt, fear, shame, insecurity, despair).



The picture below illustrates Christianity WITH a growing understanding of the gospel. In this picture we see an ever increasing appreciation of the gospel (the cross) as we further our knowledge of God's holiness and our own sinfulness.



The Christian life becomes a struggle when we don't focus the gospel and it's far reaching implications. We think the benefits of the gospel are limited to when we pass from this life to the next. But the gospel gives us freedom from our past, power of the present, AND hope for the future. The gospel not only saves us (John 3:16, Romans 10:13), but also progressively sanctifies us, allowing us to be "transformed...from one degree of glory to another" (2 Cor 3:18). Performance and pain are now replaced by worship, a realization of the grace (unearned favor) that has been afforded to us, and a pursuit of holiness out of thankfulness.

Now, if you're reading all of this and are thoroughly confused, don't worry. It's probably my lack of explanation more than your inability to understand. Please, shoot me an email and let's get together and talk about this. There's nothing I want more than to help people apply the gospel to our lives.

When someone is hurting, do *NOT* respond with:

- **Advice/instruction** – “Let me tell you how to solve the problem.” Or, “The next time that happens you should...”
- **Logic/reasoning** – “Let me analyze the situation and tell you why it happened.” Or, “I think the reason that happened was because...”
- **Pep talk** – “You’re a winner! You’ll make it through these tough times!” Or, “I’m sure tomorrow will be a better day.”
- **Minimize the incident** – “Sure it hurt, but get things into perspective; there’s a lot going on that’s good.” Or, “Aren’t you being overly sensitive?”
- **Anger** – “That makes me so mad! They shouldn’t get away with that!” (Angry at who caused the hurt.) Or, “I’m so upset that you keep getting yourself hurt.” (Angry at the one who is hurting.)
- **Martyr’s complex** – “I had something similar happen to me.” Or, “After the kind of day I had, let me tell you what hurt really feels like.”
- **Personal fear/anxiety** – “I’m afraid that’s going to affect my life too.”
- **Mr. “Fix it”** – “I can’t believe that salesman talked to you like that. I’m calling the store right now and talking to his boss.” Or, “I know you must have been scared when you had a flat tire on that lonely road. Tomorrow I’ll take the car in and get a whole new set of tires.”
- **Spiritualizing** – “Well, you know that God will work all this out for your good.” Or, “Remember what Joseph said when his brothers mistreated him: ‘They meant it for evil, but God meant it for good.’”

The best antidote for hurt is comfort. Comfort is an emotion, not a cerebral commodity. It is also very simple; if we make it complicated, we’ll miss the mark. We can comfort others through gentle words, appropriate touch, and our quiet presence.

GENTLE WORDS

While there are many words in the Oxford Dictionary, only about 40-50 words qualify as comforting words. The “vocabulary of comfort” includes phrases like these:

- “I’m really sorry that you’re hurting.”
- “It hurts me that you’re hurting because I love you and care for you.”

“It saddens me that you felt _____ (embarrassed, rejected, belittled). I know that must have hurt you.”

When comforting someone, the fewer words spoken, the better. If we say too much, we will inevitably move into the cognitive, rational realm, which will be counterproductive.

When speaking words of comfort, it’s also important that our tone of voice be complementary to what is being said. Words of comfort should be spoken gently and with compassion.

APPROPRIATE TOUCH

Proper and tender acts of physical affection can also minister comfort. Depending on the relationship, a warm embrace, a hug, holding hands, or a kiss can help communicate care and concern.

QUIET PRESENCE

Sometimes, just being *with* a person who is hurting is helpful. When I was a young minister, I wasn’t sure what to say to someone who had just lost a loved one. A wise mentor taught me that the “ministry of your presence” is powerful and effective. Just being physically present communicates care and concern.

So when you encounter someone who is hurting, do not do the nine items listed at the beginning of this essay. Do extend comfort. You’ll be amazed at the outcome.
